### New Year, New Students:

The new year has brought about the largest class of international students (Masters Degree) to the Naval Postgraduate School and SIGS. Earlier this month, we welcomed 82 international students from 31 countries (with **Cameroon** and **Papua New Guinea** sending their first students here to NPS). For this entering class, the internationals and U.S. students are equal in numbers.

**More Good News**—our global reach is extensive, in FY03, we educated 3,627 students in 140 countries through our highly successful Mobile Education Teams (MET). For the first-time ever, SIGS faculty will be in **Tajikistan**, a Central Asian country (crucial to U.S. counterterrorism efforts in Afghanistan) later this year.
